Meet the Singers — Brian Prange

Brian is thrilled to be a new member of the St Louis Chamber Chorus' bass section, and to be singing again since moving from the Chicago area. Brian grew up in Morrison, Illinois, a small town a couple of hours west of Chicago. After getting his start singing in grade school and high school, Brian took up choir and musicology in college as a much needed change of pace to his biomedical engineering studies at Northwestern University.

Thrust into the "real world" in his first engineering job after college, he quickly recognized the powerful ef-

fect that can be achieved by making great music with others. In 2008, Brian was presented with an opportunity to reunite with a childhood friend, Mark Tomasino, and be a founding member of a choir group in Chicago called the Wicker Park Choral Singers. Brian sang with them for over seven years. The group prided itself on making exceptional music readily available to all members of the Chicago community—including concerts in many areas around the city, concerts and open rehearsals for various school groups, and several appearances for Chicago's "Caroling at Cloud Gate" series.

Her mother is an excellent piano player and accompanied her in those performances. In high school and college Becca was involved in orchestra, jazz band, chorale, chamber chorus, and a cappella musical groups. She also sang in Regional and District Chorus events.

Becca earned a BA in Spanish and Latin American Studies and a minor degree in Vocal Performance at American University and an MA in Professional Language and Intercultural Studies in England at the University of Leeds. As a Spanish major, she studied abroad during her junior (Chile) and senior year (Costa Rica). She sang in a local chorus and opera group in Chile, and with the affiliated university choir in Costa Rica. During college, Becca went on a choir tour to Spain and Portugal, and then to Russia two years later. She also joined the university choir while completing her masters' degree in England. She loves to travel, and including trips with her family, has already visited 24 countries!

After her return from England she immersed herself in jazz singing. She says "I was so inspired by artists like Billie Holiday, Norah Jones, Sarah Vaughan and

Etta James, and studied seriously to find my jazz voice. It is still one of my absolute favorite genres to sing!" She has also composed music for hand bells, string quartet, chorale and more contemporary pieces.

In February 2016, Becca moved to St. Louis. She currently works in corporate relocation at SIRVA Relocation as a Global Assignment Consultant assisting companies relocating their employees around the world. She looked around for a local choir and received a response from Linda Ryder saying they needed an alto alternate for their final concert.

Becca says, "I really had no idea what I was trying out for, and feel so lucky that I virtually stumbled into the SLCC! It is such a gratifying experience to sing with Phillip and the choir—the group continuously pushes me to step up to the challenge of mastering beautiful yet sometimes unfamiliar music, and in turn to become a better musician. As my professional life is not focused around music, I am so thankful that I have this opportunity to keep music in my life in such a focused and regimented manner."

New CD Recording Planned



New Esenvalds Commission

Those fortunate enough to attend the Baltic Christmas concert in December heard an extraordinary new composition by Latvian composer and teacher Eriks Esenvalds. The work was commissioned by Kristine Suntrup as a gift to her husband Craig to mark the occasion of their 25th wedding anniversary and to celebrate their beloved children, Kelly, Elizabeth, Craig, Sydney and Grayson.

Based on Christiana Rosetti's much-loved poem In the Bleak Midwinter, this new setting of her verses was as harmonious and moving as the more familiar carol and quite captivated the audience. The singers found great delight in singing this new composition, none more so than Kris herself, one of our very own sopranos.

Kris approached Philip nearly two years before her 25th anniversary to inquire about a commission. Her thought was to give her husband and children a gift that could potentially live on, that they could "claim" as theirs and even pass on to future generations; their own family Christmas song. Kris said, "Giving my family a song is like giving them my heart for that's how important choral music is to my life. It's the most personal gift I could possibly give. I can't even begin to describe the anticipation of hearing the piece for the first time let alone the emotion of performing it. I will forever treasure the process of bringing to life a piece of music to share with the world. And now when I say 'that's our song,' I really, really mean it."
