As Philip took us through the process, we were interested in how it worked. Listening to the Chorus's beautiful, emotional performance, we thought how well the lyrics and the music capture not only the beauty of a long and lasting relationship, but also the bittersweet realization that the end of its time in this world is inevitable.

The opportunity to meet and to talk with Mårten and Tony before and after the performance was a real pleasure. They are so approachable, thoughtful, and interesting that we forgot our awe of artists and just enjoyed being with them. We feel so privileged to have been a small part of their creation.

Meet the Singers — Lori Davis

Lori grew up in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in a highly musical family. Her father is an organist, her mother a harpist, her older brother a violinist, and all three also play the piano. Naturally, she was eager to get started herself, which her parents finally allowed when she was three. They taught her piano and signed her up for private violin lessons. Lori continued to study both instruments all the way through high school and played in the Albuquerque Junior Symphony and Albuquerque Youth Symphony from sixth through twelfth grade.

In her senior year of high school, Lori decided to take voice lessons. After a single semester, she concluded that singing was not for her as she preferred instrumental music, and she dropped the voice lessons.

After arriving at Brigham Young University, Lori made friends with students who were excited about choir. She sang so she could hang out with them and quickly changed her mind about vocal music. She signed up for voice lessons, ultimately studying with

Elizabeth Pike, Dr. Ruth Christensen, and David Poole. Lori, a soprano, also spent three years singing in the BYU Singers under the direction of Dr. Ronald Staheli. During that time, they toured in Italy, West Africa, and Hawaii. They also recorded two albums for Tantara Records, one of African-American spirituals and one of the choral works of Eric Whitacre.

Lori graduated in History, with minors in Music and Linguistics, and began working as a legal editor for LexisNexis. She has continued in

that job off and on ever since, even through various moves to Connecticut, Germany, Scotland, and now here to St. Louis, where she arrived with her husband and daughter three years ago. Along the way Lori has sung in the Yale Camerata under Marguerite L. Brooks and the Scottish National Orchestra Chorus under Gregory Batsleer. She has given recitals in Santa Fe, New Mexico, Albuquerque, New Mexico, and more locally at the St. Louis Abbey. She regularly performs for churches and schools, and maintains a small piano studio on the side. This is Lori's third season with the St. Louis Chamber Chorus.

Meet the Singers — Bill Larson

Bill Larson has been an active singer in the St. Louis community for the past 30 years with his particular passion being for choral music. "I am proud to say I have been a huge fan of the SLCC since the early 1990's and am thrilled to be singing with them this season." Bill studied voice at Indiana University in Bloomington and when he returned to St. Louis, got his first church job as section leader at St. Michael and St. George Church in Clayton. He also joined the St. Louis Symphony Chorus as one of the tenor section leaders and sang with them for 17 seasons. In 1997 he ioined the St. Louis Cathedral Choir

as a cantor and section leader and in 1999 was selected as one of the soloists for the St. Louis papal visit of Pope John Paul II ("definitely a highlight among my singing experiences"). Bill has sung in some very fine early music ensembles including the Washington University Early Music Ensemble for two seasons and the more recently formed Pro Arte Singers under the direction of Horst Buchholz. In 2004 under the direction of Robert Bergt, Bill joined the American Kantorei Choir dedicated to singing the great choral works of J. S. Bach.


