Linda keeps up with our subscribers through advertisements, our website, our mailings and the many one-on-one relationships that she has helped nurture over the years.



Next Season – A New Composition at Each Concert

One of the exciting features of our new season, *Dance to the Music of Time*, will be the inclusion at each performance of a brand new work written for the Chamber Chorus. This accords with our mission to promote new choral music to be shared not only with our singers and listeners in St. Louis, but also with the wider musical community around the globe. The composers who have agreed to write for us in 2017-2018 are, in order of the premieres, Mårten Jansson (Sweden), Stuart McIntosh (UK), Wolfram Buchenberg (Germany), Francis Pott (UK), Sydney Guillaume (Haiti/USA), and Melissa Dunphy (USA). And as with Judith Bingham, we hope to welcome many of these international composers to St. Louis to hear their new works in person.

And it is not too soon to start thinking about 2018-2019; to engage inspired, talented composers who are greatly in demand requires plenty of 'lead time'. We have already contracted with some leading composers, and are currently responding to supporters of the Chorus who are interested in commissioning a new work. Recording Session

At the tail end of February, Chorus members gave up four consecutive nights to record our next CD, St. Louis Classics. As the title would suggest, the repertoire was a selection of major works from the canon, with compositions by Gretchaninov, Kodály, Schumann and Sibelius. Rarities from familiar names included premiere recordings of large-scale works by Bantock and Vaughan Williams, and we slipped in Bob Chilcott's fantasia on the classic Elizabethan madrigal, The Silver Swan. A selection of iconic a cappella works, then, and definitely something to look forward to!

We anticipate a release date of November 2017, so look for an announcement on our website and at our concerts in the Fall.

Reception After the Concert

There will be a reception adjacent to the church immediately following the performance for all concert-goers. This will be an opportunity to meet composer Judith Bingham, whose premiere Ceaselessly Weaving Your Name will be heard in this last concert of the season, and also to thank Linda Ryder for her many years of service with the Chorus. COMMOTIO to Sing Silver Swan

It's such a delight when one of 'our' commissions is taken up by another choir, and this has already happened with one of the season's new pieces. Bob Chilcott's Silver Swan that SLCC premiered last November at the New Mt. Sinai Hebrew Cemetery will soon be sung by one of Britain's most innovative and accomplished chamber choirs —COMMOTIO.

The ensemble, based in Oxford, will include the Chilcott work in a program with the theme of birds and birdsong on 10 June; this will be the UK premiere of Silver Swan which has just been published by Oxford University Press.
