New Recording Sessions

This past November saw the Chamber Chorus in recording sessions again. For this occasion, the repertoire was a wide selection of the choral works of **Sir Granville Bantock**. The recording venue was Our Lady of Sorrows Church on south Kingshighway, and the recording production was again under the direction of our friend **Gary Cole** of Regent Records. Gary returned to us from the UK exactly two years after producing our most recent CD, *Saint Louis Commissions*. And, once again, **Barry Hufker**, recording engineer, and **Martha Shaffer** were on hand to assist the effort in innumerable ways.

During four chilly evening recording sessions, the complete program of Bantock pieces proposed by Philip to Gary was accomplished. On one evening, singers from both Washington University and Parkway North High School choirs joined SLCC to participate in the sessions. Even a 45-minute delay (due to a wedding rehearsal) on the final recording

evening did not deter the effort, and the compilation is now "in the can."

Over the next few months, both Philip and Gary will

participate in the editing process that ultimately results in issuance of the final product. The anticipated release date for the CD should be sometime in 2009 or 2010. Stay tuned!

Visiting Composers at Final Two Concerts

Two distinguished composers will be in the audience to hear their new works premiered by the Chamber Chorus in the final two concerts of the season. On April 5, **Stephen Paulus** will travel from the Twin Cities to hear his *Stabat Mater*, written to complement a monumental setting of the same text by the 16th century Italian master, Palestrina. Paulus will be familiar to opera lovers for his close relationship with the Opera Theatre of St. Louis that yielded five new works. Dr. Paulus has also written for numerous major orchestras and has been awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship.

Our season concludes a remarkable juxtaposition: the complex and enthralling Missa In Illo Tempore of Claudio Monteverdi (1567-1643) with a series of recent works by Clare Maclean. Several of these have been written expressly for the Chamber Chorus, the fruits of Clare's 'residency' with us, with one work—Psalm 137—being composed specifically for this concert. We will be thrilled to welcome Clare and her husband John Carroll on their first visit to the USA; she will work with the singers in their final rehearsals, as well as discussing her experiences as a composer in Sydney, Australia, in several interviews and workshops.

Meet the Singers — Amanda Meinen

There was always music in the Meinen home. Amanda started piano lessons at the age of five, which was a great foundation for her future musical endeavors. In third grade, she sang with the Rainbows, her first choir. In sixth grade, she played oboe in the school band. She played through sophomore year of high school when the band director changed his focus...unfortunately, oboes don't play in marching bands!

In junior high and high school, Amanda participated in solo and ensemble contests in the areas of voice, oboe and piano, continuing to state for oboe and


piano. She also participated in all of her school's musicals. In high school, Amanda knew that music was to be part of her life, but didn't want to teach music. One day, her choir teacher's sister came into class to talk about music therapy, and she knew that she had found the perfect path for her ...combining her love of music with a passion for helping people.

Music therapy is an established healthcare profession that uses music to address physical, emotional, cognitive, and social needs

of individuals of all ages. It improves the quality of life for well persons and meets the needs of children and adults with disabilities or illnesses. Basically, that means using music to achieve non-musical goals.

Amanda attended the University of Evansville to study music therapy where she also had her first dose of music theory! She had to start in a remedial class because she had had absolutely no previous exposure to music theory. She picked it up quickly due to her piano background, and also had her first formal voice training with Joseph Hopkins. Enjoying a wide range of music, she sang with the Concert Choir, Kantorei, Jazz Choir, and Chapel Choir!

For the past 7 years, Amanda has worked as a music therapist at the Illinois Center for Autism. She works with individuals on the autism spectrum, aged 3 to 21. Amanda says it is challenging and frustrating at times, but it is also incredibly rewarding to see how much she can impact the lives of her students.

The sister was Elise Ibendahl, and the chorus was the St. Louis Chamber Chorus. Amanda auditioned later that summer and has been singing with the Chorus ever since!

Amanda is known for her unusual fundraising activities. Many Chorus members actively participate in

events to raise money for charitable organizations, but Amanda's is a bit more shocking (literally!) She participated in a Polar Plunge last year to raise money for Special Olympics (one of the charities in which many of her students are involved) and was able to raise over \$2,000. So she decided to do it again this year! She says, "It's amazing how many people tell me to go jump in the lake!"

Amanda's parents have always been incredibly supportive of her musical endeavors. When she went to college 4 hours away, they would drive out for an afternoon concert and home again that evening. They have been subscribers since she joined the Chamber Chorus and almost without exception, have been at every single performance of her life. She says' I'm lucky to have such understanding and supportive parents, and only hope that their lives have been enriched by the variety of music that they've gotten to hear through the years!''
